ecently, the Alzheimer's Association, Connecticut Chapter, and Band Together teamed up to host 2015's Band Together at the Fairfield Theatre Company. The emcee of the sold-out concert was Spyro Gyra alum, and two-time Latin Grammy winner, Dave Samuels. Mr. Samuels is one of five million Americans who are currently living with the disease. To date, locally based Band Together has raised more than \$1.4 million to aid area charities. Proceeds from this year's concert for Alzheimer's help the Alzheimer's Association support some 72,000 Connecticut residents living with the disease as well as their 176,000 caregivers.


